Cynthia Endicott – 2309 Cincinnati Street, Steilacoom: She expressed concerns about vehicle storage on Cincinnati St. They have had problems with vehicles trying to turn around in the 11 ft wide street end and she would prefer to not have long-term parking on that street. She also thanked Town staff for their response to her request for a "Dead End" sign. It has reduced the number of turnarounds taking place.

The answer is that no one can just declare their ADU an emergency dwelling. People would still need to get a conditional use permit by making a case for it in a public hearing before Council.

# REPORTS: Administrator

# Town Administrator Loveless reported the following:

• The Parks and Community Services Advisory Board Meeting was hacked last night. Procedures are being put in place to prevent that from happening again.

#### **Attorney**

Attorney Hoffman reported no new litigation.

#### **Public Safety**

#### **Chief Yabe** reported the following:

• He observed the final testing for their latest recruit officer, PJ Palma, at the police academy. Public Safety is coordinating the on-the-job training period for all of their recruits as they finish the academy.

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# **Public Safety Cont'd**

- This week, Sergeant Chris Bailey, their newest patrol supervisor, completed his state-mandated training as a first-level supervisor.
- Public Safety has a few grant requests in-progress. They pertain to hiring, body cameras, and less lethal devices.
- He attended last week's meeting of the Public Safety Advisory Board.
   He observed a great deal of interest in the Board, and he looks forward to future meetings.
- He received additional concerns regarding speeding throughout Town.
   He appreciates the continued feedback from the community regarding these concerns and is grateful for the patience and understanding of our residents as they continue to work through this time period.
- Serious traffic collisions continue to plague the region. Meanwhile, the
  word is spreading regarding the changes to law enforcement protocol
  as a result of the police reform legislation. Incidents of apparent
  taunting of law enforcement officers by some drivers are increasing.
  Increased instances of fleeing from traffic stops have occurred in
  Steilacoom, DuPont, and Pierce County.
- They are still awaiting the new legislation regarding license suspensions to take effect. A suspended license has traditionally been the only means to hold violators accountable for failing to pay their speeding ticket. Additionally, due to the increasing prevalence of citations for suspended drivers, courts are running out of room on their calendars to hold hearings for suspended license arrests. All of this collectively results in an environment where it would seem that the only drivers to be held accountable for their driving offenses are the drivers who choose to hold themselves accountable; those who both choose to stop for police and who choose to pay their tickets.
- The mental health treatment community has been sounding the alarm for increased prevalence of mental health crises throughout our communities since the early days of the pandemic. Our Town is also feeling the impact of these issues. Pursuant to our legislative reforms, incidents involving mental health require more time and resources, which can inhibit our officers' availability for traffic enforcement. One such incident occurred a couple of weeks ago and was witnessed by several passersby. One of the passersby wrote him an email that commended the efforts of our officers to de-escalate a driver in crisis and coordinate assistance for them. The email also stated that another passerby expressed that they believed our officers were going to shoot the person in crisis and that they could not trust the police.
- Despite these ongoing circumstances, they're very excited to get their new officers out on the road to help increase their presence in our problem areas. He's grateful for the efforts of our current officers who have responded with professionalism and empathy throughout the pandemic conditions and legislative changes that we all continue to navigate.

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#### **Public Works**

## **Public Works Director Burlingame** reported the following:

 Pivetta Brothers is currently working on the fourth quadrant of the Roundabout. He is happy to report that the last deep utility installation was completed today. Surface work will be taking place now. The project is on track.

#### Council

#### **Councilmember Crumley** reported the following:

- He attended a training hosted by the Association of WA Cities (AWC) on how cities in the state are utilizing American Rescue Plan Act funds. He will meet with Staff and Mayor to discuss how funds might be spent.
- He has earned his Certificate of Municipal Leadership with the aforementioned training.
- He got an email from a short-term rental owner. He would like to discuss its contents at a future meeting.

# **Councilmember Henderson** reported the following:

- She thanked the Street Crew for their work repainting lines on the roadways. They look good.
- In regard to the comment on parking on Cincinnati St., she cited an ordinance that likely precludes any parking down there. She suggests that Town staff take a look at it.
- She would like to see a brief written report on the activities of our Building Inspector/Code Compliance Officer.

# Councilmember Neal reported the following:

- The Friends of the Steilacoom Library book sale at the Community Center went well. He thanked Town Administrator Loveless for making the building available. They raised \$1300.
- He has had several positive interactions with Public Works and Public Safety staff recently. He praised their communication, friendliness, and skill.

## **Councilmember Smith** reported the following:

• In twenty years, he's never seen a vote to reconsider an agenda bill until the previous Council Meeting. When he votes for something, it is his final decision. He does not think it is proper to rescind a vote, even if it is legal. He does not think the bill that received the revote and passed will be of any benefit to the Town.
