

Steilacoom Civil Service Commission Minutes
May 5, 2022

<p><u>Call to Order:</u></p>	<p>Chair Lynch called the May 5, 2022 meeting of the Steilacoom Civil Service Commission to order at 2:06 p.m. via Zoom.</p>
<p><u>Roll Call:</u></p>	<p>In attendance were Chair Lynch, Vice-chair Constantine, and Commissioner Still. Mayor Muri was in attendance. Staff members present were Town Administrator, Paul Loveless, Chief Yabe, Detective Hamrick, and Secretary Sterbick.</p>
<p><u>Approval of Minutes:</u> April 14, 2022</p> <p>Yes: All</p>	<p>Vice-chair Constantine moved to approve and Chair Lynch seconded approval of the February 3, 2022 minutes as written.</p>
<p><u>Register Name Removal</u></p> <p>Yes: All</p>	<p>Detective Hamrick presented a name for withdrawal from the lateral register indicating the individual had been hired by another agency.</p> <p>Vice-chair Constantine moved to certify the applicant withdrawal. Commissioner Still seconded approval.</p>
<p><u>Proposed Rule Change</u> <u>6.10.050.2</u></p> <p>Yes: All</p> <p><u>Proposed Rule Change</u> <u>6.10.050.3</u></p>	<p>Chief Yabe explained the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission (CJTC) has adjusted their rules/training requirements regarding lateral candidates coming into Washington. He stated the CJTC is now performing an individual assessment of each candidate and their past training to make a determination as to whether the candidate will be required to attend/pass an equivalency academy (2 wks.) or the basic law enforcement academy (4.5 mos.) in order to be certified in Washington.</p> <p>Chief explained the intent of the proposed language is to acknowledge and bring our rules in line with the CJTC. Chief Yabe explained we want to be clear with applicants that the CJTC will decide whether applicants are to attend the equivalency academy or the basic law enforcement academy.</p> <p>Vice-chair Constantine moved to change the language in rule 6.10.090.2 to reflect the CJTC has discretion in determining training required by the applicant to obtain Washington State certification. Commissioner Still seconded approval.</p> <p>This section covers exceptional hires, those applicants whose law enforcement certifications have lapsed as they have been out of law enforcement over 24 months but not more than 60 months. Chief Yabe explained these applicants were previously required to attend an equivalency academy but will now be subject to review/discretion of the CJTC as to whether they will attend the equivalency academy or basic law enforcement academy.</p> <p>Vice-chair Constantine moved to change the language in rule 6.10.090.3 to reflect the CJTC has discretion in determining training required by the</p>

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
